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Prayers

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Committee of Inquiry into recent suicides at La  
Moye Prison.

The Deputy Bailiff made a statement in the  
following terms -

“Following the request of the Prison Board  
to establish a Committee of Inquiry to  
examine the circumstances surrounding the  
two recent suicides at La Moye Prison, the  
Bailiff has appointed Jurat P.G. Blampied,  
O.B.E., Chairman, Jurat E.J.M. Potter,  
I.S.O., and Dr. Margaret Bruce to carry out  
that task. An official from the States  
Greffe will act as secretary to the  
committee.

The terms of reference of the committee  
will be -

“To inquire into the circumstances  
surrounding the suicides of Andrew  
Philip Stopher and Stuart Mark Peter  
Hannaford at La Moye Prison and the

adequacy of measures taken to prevent a recurrence of such fatalities, and, if appropriate, to make such recommendations as they think fit.'

The Committee will in general determine its own procedure but will receive oral evidence in public. It will in due course report to the Bailiff who will lay the report before the States."

Waterfront Enterprise Board - questions and  
answers (Tape No. 303)

The Connétable of St. Helier asked Senator

Reginald Robert Jeune, President of the Policy and Resources Committee, the following questions -

- ``1. Would the President advise members when the Committee proposes to present to the States a report on the progress regarding the development of the waterfront area and the plans of the Waterfront Enterprise Board (``WEB")?
2. Is it the Committee's intention to institute a full debate on the development proposals prior to investing WEB with the authority to proceed?
3. The Strategic Policy Review 1995 Part II identifies among the Lower Priority Projects to 2000 (paragraph 7.18 on page 60), the retention of the Weighbridge bus terminus at its present site and the construction of buildings and the creation of an `enclosed area'. The statement is also made that ``the Weighbridge area needs to form a `back-stop' to Liberation Square rather than remain as it is, if the benefit of Liberation Square is to be maximised in architectural terms". Having regard for the fact that the States has twice decided, in the Island Plan debate and in the debate on the St. Helier Waterfront Plan based on the work of Andrews Downie, that the bus terminus should be relocated to the Island site, would the President -
  - (a) explain why a proposal contrary to those decisions is included in the Strategic Policy Review, and
  - (b) undertake to provide the States with an opportunity to debate this specific subject at an early date?"

The President of the Policy and Resources Committee replied as follows -

- ``1. My Committee will be considering a draft report and proposition later this week on which it will also be seeking the views of the Planning and Environment Committee. Once these views are known, the Policy and Resources Committee will finalise its report and proposition and I hope to be in a

position to present this to the House before the end of October.

2. My Committee is fully aware of the wish of many States members to have an opportunity to express their views on the way forward for the development of the Waterfront area and as stated in the answer to the previous question it is the intention to provide members with that opportunity at an early date.
3. The Strategic Policy Review 1995 Part II in referring to the lower priority projects to 2000 (paragraph 7.18 on page 60) merely provides a précis description of all the individual projects for which capital funds were requested by Committees, including the Waterfront Enterprise Board. This descriptive summary of what the request involves does not in any way imply that what is being put forward has the support of my Committee or of the States.

The Connétable will be aware from recent media comment, following a meeting between representatives of the Waterfront Enterprise Board and the Tourism Committee, that the Board has undertaken to review the options for the future location of the buses. I would also point out in this respect that there can be no departure from the Town Map No. 3-92 approved by the States on 10th November 1992 (which map is based on the work of Andrews Downie and provides for the buses to be located on the Weighbridge `Island' site) without the prior approval of the States."

Dumping at Ronez - questions and answers (Tape No. 303)

Deputy Philip John Rondel of St. John asked Deputy Harry Hallewell Baudains of St. Clement, Vice-President of the Planning and Environment Committee, the following questions -

1. Is the Vice-President aware that, the President advised me, in a letter, dated 25th July 1995, that the Sea Fisheries Adviser had prepared a report on the effects of dumping at Ronez?

Would the Vice-President advise members

if it is the intention of the Planning and Environment Committee to publish that report?

2. Is the Vice-President aware that the letter of 25th July stated that a visiting coastal expert had also given advice on the long-term effect of the dumping on the marine environment?

Would the Vice-President inform the States of the name of that expert and the extent of his expertise in these matters?

3. Did the Sea Fisheries Adviser and the visiting expert carry out a full examination of the area? If so, would the Vice-President inform members how far below chart datum has the rubble, silt, etc. gone out to sea, both in an easterly and northerly direction?
4. Would the Vice-President state the estimated gross tonnage of material that has been tipped into the sea?
5. Is the Vice-President aware that in a letter, dated 12th July 1995, the President of the Agriculture and Fisheries Committee claimed that the Planning and Environment Committee had already carried out an independent survey of the area. Would the Vice-President confirm whether such a survey was carried out and, if so, is it the intention of the Planning and Environment Committee to publish the results of the survey?"

The Vice-President of the Planning and Environment Committee replied as follows -

1. I am aware of the letter sent to Deputy Rondel on 25th July 1995. Indeed I have circulated a copy of that letter, together with a copy of the report of the Sea Fisheries Adviser for all members to see.

In addition, I have circulated for the information of Deputy Rondel and other members, a copy of a letter from the States' Environmental Adviser expressing similar views on the matter.

2. The visiting expert was Dr. Eric C. F. Bird.

Dr. Bird is a coastal geomorphologist,



a graduate of King's College, London, and the Australian National University, Canberra. He has held lecturing posts at University College, London, and the Australian National University, and is now a Reader in Geomorphology at the University of Melbourne as well as Project Co-Ordinator for Coastal Research at the United Nations University, Tokyo. He was Chairman of the International Geographical Union Commission on the Coastal Environment from 1972 to 1984.

As such, Dr. Bird is an internationally recognised expert on coastal geomorphology.

3. No. Both were asked for an opinion based on the information available and reasonably observable.

The Sea Fisheries Adviser's note and drawing indicates the eastward extent of the drift of dumped material - approximately 500 metres. The sea bed falls away steeply in this area and the northern extent of deposits is not readily discernible from the water surface or from the land.

4. In the light of the answer to question 3 it has not been possible to quantify the tonnage of the dumped material.
5. I am not aware of the letter to which the Deputy refers in this question.

The Planning and Environment Committee has not carried out an independent survey of the Ronez area other than those referred to already.

Ronez Limited itself commissioned a study earlier this year into the environmental impact of its operations. It was advised by the States Environmental Adviser (then the Planning Department's Conservation Officer) in the selection of a consultant.

The study, by Oakwood Environmental, was conducted in consultation with the Planning Department, and made certain recommendations for changes in the practices of the company. These included, among other things, a review of the practice of depositing aggregates on the western foreshore for

washing and rounding prior to subsequent use in concrete making and tipping on the eastern foreshore to strengthen sea defences against the considerable erosion that takes place.

As a result of the study, and in a written agreement with the Committee in May 1995, both of these operations ceased immediately and have not resumed since.

The Company has applied to the Committee to construct a rock wall on the eastern foreshore to stabilise the erosion.

As the report was commissioned by the company, it is not within the gift of the Committee to make copies available to members."

On-street closed circuit television - questions and answers (Tape No. 303)

Deputy Gary Matthews of St. Brelade asked Deputy Michael Adam Wavell of St. Saviour, President of the Defence Committee, the following questions -

1. In Appendix 3.6 to the Strategic Policy Review 1995 - Part II, Resources Plan, (page 29), which describes individual projects within the recommended capital programme 1996 - 1999, there appears in section 2.2. 'States Police' an item for 'On Street CCTV' of £300,000 to 'continue with the initiative commenced in 1995'.

Would the President agree that -

- (a) States' members have received no information of the appraisal of the six-month 'trial' of the closed circuit television unit, situated on top of the Central Market;
  - (b) States members should not be asked to approve the capital expenditure item for 'On Street CCTV' until the States have had the opportunity to consider an appraisal of the 'trial'?
2. Will the President undertake to report

back to members before the end of 1995 with either a full statement on his Committee's policy on CCTV and the success, or otherwise, of the `trial' camera or a proposition requesting the States to approve `in principle' the continuation of the experiment?

3. What decisions have the Defence Committee made with respect to the required number and location of CCTV cameras in 1996?
4. Has the Committee taken advice as to whether it is possible for film from the surveillance cameras to be used as evidence in the Police or Royal Courts? Would the President undertake to communicate any such advice to States members?"

The President of the Defence Committee replied as follows -

- 1.(a) The purpose of the current `trial' of the CCTV camera on Beresford Street is to examine the technical options available for a town centre scheme. It is not the purpose of this `trial' to decide on the need for a more comprehensive installation. Members of my Committee fully support the installation of CCTV as one positive step towards our aims to reduce crime and apprehend offenders. Following the six month `trial' the States of Jersey Police will use the technical information gathered, together with that obtained from other areas with CCTV in operation in order to produce an operational requirement. It is with reference to this specification that potential suppliers will bid for a contract. These tendering documents will be subject to the approval of my Committee. If States' members wish to have access to these documents after they have been submitted to my Committee I will be pleased to discuss this with you at the appropriate stage of the tendering process.
- (b) As already stated, the objectives of the `trial' relate to the investigation of technical

options. The information gleaned from the `trial' will be used to produce tendering documents and not to produce some form of `appraisal' of CCTV as a concept. My Committee is unanimous in its support of the use of CCTV. The objectives of the `trial' are to determine the suitability of the currently available technology for capture, transmission and storage of video images.

2. The installation of CCTV as a measure to combat the problems of public disorder is a matter for my Committee. The use of CCTV in public car parks administered by the Public Services Committee (of which Deputy Matthews is a member) has been a success which we on the Defence Committee wish to mirror. At no time was the question of cameras in public car parks debated in the House. The reason for this was that Public Services saw the security of vehicles and the public in their car park as being the responsibility of their Committee as policing of our streets is one of the responsibilities of my Committee. I have been given a mandate by this House to explore new initiatives in the fight against crime and public order. I am delighted, as are members of my Committee, that the Policy and Resources Committee has recognised the importance of law and order within its Strategic Policy document. Already, the States of Jersey Police and Honorary Police are co-operating in the use of this technology, with both organisations recognising the potential of such equipment.
3. No decision can yet be made as to the exact number and deployment of on-street cameras during 1996. It would be cavalier in the extreme to make sweeping assumptions without having conducted appropriate research into all the available options. The Research Department of the States of Jersey Police is working to a pre-defined and professional project plan in order to produce a system appropriate to the needs of the Island. Operational requirements will be submitted to my Committee during November with the aim of installing an on-street CCTV scheme in St. Helier during the summer of

1996. This will probably represent the first phase of the project as I have no doubt that the public will request further enhancements as the system proves its success.

4. There is a responsibility on the Police to ensure that wherever possible the 'best evidence' must be made available and used in Courts. The use of videotape is one such piece of evidence available to the Police in their fight against crime and public disorder. In fact, I am able to illustrate the use of such evidence by certain examples where, as a direct result of videotape being made available to the Police and the Courts, offenders have been captured and subsequently convicted.

One such case involved the identification of a suspect and a vehicle from security video equipment in Pier Road car park, as a result of which five youths were questioned and an admission gained that nine strip lights in this car park had been damaged. Another case involved the apprehension of offenders in connexion with stealing property from a vehicle, again in Pier Road car park, again where CCTV was available. Thirdly, another example involved videotape evidence which was made available to the Police from a bank in St. Helier, which identified the offender using a stolen credit card and making cash withdrawals from a cash-point machine in Bath Street. Incidentally, the time and date on which these withdrawals were made were also available on the tape. This was crucial evidence and enabled the Police to take still photographs from the video and submit those photographs as evidence to the Courts.

I am sure that few of you will disagree that results such as this are most encouraging in our drive to reduce crime and public disorder in Jersey. I need not remind you that this was very much the thrust of the Strategy Policy document in connexion with reducing crime and I think that by exemplifying these cases, two of which arose from public service car parks and the other a financial institution, in many ways answers Deputy Gary Matthews' question, that, yes, videotape evidence is being used for the Courts as best evidence and will continue to be so."

- (b) authorised the Attorney General and the Greffier of the States to pass, on behalf of the public, any contract which it might be found necessary to pass in connexion with the purchase of the said property and any interests therein;
- (c) authorised the payment or discharge of any expenses to be incurred in connexion with the purchase of the said property and of all interests therein from the Harbours and Airport Committee's vote of credit "Airport Operating Expenses" (Vote No. 1706).

St. Saviour's Hospital: charges for elderly long-stay patients - P.60/95 (Revised)
