Voluntary Early Retirement scheme - questions and answers (Tape No. 334)

Senator Richard Joseph Shenton asked Deputy Frank Harrison Walker of St. Helier, President of the Establishment Committee, the following questions -

- "1. Will the President inform members of the number of senior civil servants who have applied for, and been allowed to take, voluntary early retirement?
- 2. Will the President inform members of the cost to the taxpayer of the early retirement packages?
- 3. Will the President inform members of the number of senior civil servants who have been re-employed by the States in any capacity after accepting voluntary early retirement?"

The President of the Establishment Committee replied as follows -

``1. In answering this question, I have had to make some assumptions. First, I have assumed that the period to which the question refers dates from when I became President of the Establishment Committee at the end of 1993; second, I have interpreted the expression `senior civil servant' as civil servants in grade 11 and

above - i.e. the management grades; and third, I have assumed that the Senator is referring to voluntary redundancies as well as voluntary early retirements given that there can be a very fine distinction between the two.

I can advise the Senator that since December, 1993, 22 senior civil servants have been granted voluntary early retirement or voluntary redundancy. This figure includes the five applications from the Public Services Department recently announced.

2. The total cost of voluntary early retirement and voluntary redundancy since December 1993, for the 22 senior civil servants referred to, is £1.84m. The total cost of the programme throughout the entire public sector over this period is £3.19m. These are one-off costs.

The voluntary early retirement and voluntary redundancy programme forms a major part of my Committee's initiative to make the public service more efficient and effective. These severances normally result in the deletion of posts, and I can advise the House that these policies (approved by the States in 1995 when accepting the manpower section of Strategic Policy Review) have resulted in savings of £1.17m a year.

In some cases, posts are not saved but the voluntary retirement is allowed in the interests of promoting greater efficiency within the service.

3. In order that there can be no misunderstanding whatsoever, I can advise the House that there is one senior medical officer, who has recently accepted voluntary early retirement and who, for many years, has had a private, ad hoc arrangement whereby in his own time, he has assisted the police with counselling officers who have been involved in traumatic, stressful incidents.

I understand that this arrangement could continue in the future, but this is entirely a matter for the Defence Committee, and is unrelated to the post from which the officer has retired. As a result of this retirement, a post saving has been achieved.

Apart from this one possible, unusual situation, I can inform the House that there are no recorded examples of senior civil servants having accepted voluntary early retirement or voluntary redundancy, being re-employed by the States in any capacity."

Les Viviers de Ste. Catherine, St. Martin - questions and answers (Tape No. 334)

Deputy Frederick John Hill of St. Martin asked Senator Antony Beresford Chinn, Vice-President of the Harbours and Airport Committee, the following questions -

- '1. The previous lease by the public of Les Viviers de Ste. Catherine and the surrounding area on which the portakabins and freezer units currently stand having expired on 31st March 1996, would the President advise members what plans the Committee has for the future use of the area? Does the Committee intend to continue to lease the land and, if so, what steps is it taking to find a suitable tenant?
- 2. While the Committee considers its future plans for the area what steps does it propose to take regarding the present condition of the property, and do these steps include the removal of the portakabins and freezer unit that are presently on site?
- 3. Following the recent landslides in and around the tunnel area, would the President advise members how safe the area is at present and whether any remedial measures are necessary to ensure the general safety of the area and to allow for it to be used productively in future?"

The Vice-President of the Harbours and Airport Committee replied as follows -

- The tunnels and surrounding areas were until 31st March 1996 leased to Fish Port Limited and the Committee had for a considerable time been involved in negotiations with the beneficial owner of that company to grant a further lease which would have enabled a new company, Kingdom of the Sea (Jersey) Limited, to convert the tunnels for use as an aquarium, sea life and interpretation centre. A report and proposition (P.23/94) was lodged on 1st March 1994, but subsequently withdrawn when it became known that the company wished in addition to the aforementioned development, to provide a restaurant on the site. The company's lawyers have recently asked the Committee whether it would still be prepared to grant a new lease and the Committee has responded that it would be willing to recommend such a new lease provided that no restaurant or similar facility was included within the development. However no further detailed negotiations have taken place, although a meeting with the various parties has been arranged towards the end of May. No other approaches have been made to the Committee for alternative uses for the tunnels and the Committee has taken no steps to find another tenant. Any proposals the Committee may have with regard to the future use of these areas will be brought to the House for its approval.
- 2. The Committee intends to tidy up the area and has advised the previous tenant that it would not give approval for the portakabins and freezer units to remain on the site beyond 31st March 1996 and steps are being taken to ensure the removal of these units as soon as possible.
- 3. There has been no general landslide,

but a small rockfall occurred recently in the area near to the tunnel entrance on the western side of the rock. An investigation was undertaken by the Public Services Department in order to determine the degree of instability of the rockface and to establish the cost of remedial action. The results of this investigation suggest that the rockface above this entrance could be secured at a cost of approximately £15,000. In the meantime the area has been roped off, the doors to the tunnels secured and signs have been erected advising the public to keep clear of the area. The Committee has yet to decide whether to proceed with the securing of the rockface and the future use of the tunnels will have some bearing on this decision."

Public Service recruitment policy - statement

The President of the Establishment Committee made a statement in the following terms -

"Members will recall from the discussions held in connexion with the 1995 Strategic Policy Review that the Establishment Committee had put forward a number of proposals concerning those who do not possess residential housing qualifications and their recruitment and employment by the public sector.

Of the eight proposals that had been recommended by the Establishment Committee, six had been accepted by the Policy and Resources Committee and are in the process of being implemented. The remaining two, whilst recognised by the latter Committee as putting the public sector on a level playing field with the private sector, nevertheless caused concern to that Committee that their implementation would adversely affect the job opportunities available to Island residents. As a result, the Policy and Resources Committee requested the Establishment Committee to report to the States on its recruitment and training policies in order to assist the States to judge whether it would wish to adopt the two outstanding proposals put forward by the Establishment Committee.

In the light of the concerns expressed by the Policy and Resources Committee, the Establishment Committee has reviewed its earlier decision and has decided not to proceed in the way that it had originally intended. It has, instead, determined that it would want to adjust its existing policies to provide, in future, that those who have been resident in the Island for a minimum period of five years and who have -

- (a) attended full-time schooling at one of the local schools; or
- (b) qualified in a profession or trade where it has been demonstrated to the satisfaction of the Establishment Committee that it is most unlikely that sufficient local residents would be available to fill potential vacancies over a period of the following three years,

will be entitled to be employed on a permanent basis within the public sector. It is important to note that this approach will only be adopted where the Establishment Committee is satisfied that an administering Committee's requirements could not be fully met by the application of a suitable training course for Island residents. In addition, the Committee would seek to establish whether there were any local students being educated in the United Kingdom who would be suitable to fill a vacant post and who were likely to return to the Island in the near future.

It is stressed that employment of people on these revised terms will not give rise to entitlement to lease controlled accommodation in the Island. The offer of employment will, as far as the rules in connection with local accommodation is concerned, be on the basis that such people will be subject to the same rules that apply to those who are employed by the private sector.

The changes that my Committee are about to implement will bring about an easement in the rules that apply to those who have been connected with the Island for five years or more. However, as the government of this Island, my Committee recognises that we should seek, wherever possible, to

employ those who have attained full residential status.

In advising States' members of these changes, I would, therefore, also want to remind them of the considerable investment, both of time and money, that the Establishment Committee and other Committees have made in recent years to train local people for public sector jobs. I am happy to confirm this morning that the efforts of the Establishment Committee to maintain this emphasis on training local people to take up positions within the public sector remain undiminished and that the proposals that I have just announced will not detract in any way from these initiatives.

Finally, in order to assist Committees and States departments, I have asked the Chief Executive Officer of the States Personnel Department to write to all chief officers to explain in more detail the manner in which these proposals will now be put into effect."

Channel House, Green Street, St. Helier: lease of office accommodation and car parking - P.64/96

THE STATES, adopting a proposition of the Telecommunications Board -

- (a) approved the leasing by the public from the Beaufort Hotel Company Limited of the third floor offices and car parking spaces at Channel House, Green Street, St. Helier, for the purpose of accommodating the Telecommunications Board's major accounts sales staff, for a period of nine years from a date to be arranged, at an annual rental of £31,750 for the office accommodation (representing a rate of £12.25 a square foot) and £6,250 for the car parking spaces (representing a rate of £1,250 a year for each space) this rental to be subject to review at the end of every third year, to open market rental value, but never to reduce below the current rental at the time of the review:
- (b) authorised the Greffier of the States to sign the lease;
- (c) authorised the Treasurer of the States to pay the rent as it became due.
